The checkerboard outfield is relatively new to our nation's pastime. Due to its resemblance to the Mosaic Pavement found in many lodges some believe it to be significantly Masonic. The Mosaic Pavement is referred to as the "Path of Life". Its contrasting black and white squares are emblematic of the duality of human life, checkered with good and evil.



You can have outfield-like grass, or a Masonic symbol if that's your thing, right on your own lawn. Admit it, you've thought about it before. Just follow these simple instructions: <u>Checkerboard Lawn</u>. (*The D7N Editorial Board hasn't yet come up with a plausible explanation for your wife when she asks why you did this.*)

If indeed outfields are emblematic of human life it is represented there by contrasting squares of dark and light green. Some think there may be symbolic meaning in where the ball lands or is caught. I'm skeptical of this.

2020 Ritual Competition Updated

Previously known as the Senior Warden's Competition, the competition has been expanded to encourage greater ritual proficiency and now includes both individual and team categories:

- Senior Wardens Competition Following the same format as in the past, open to first time Senior Wardens. Must open and close on degree chosen at time of competition, call down, resume, labor to refreshment, and refreshment to labor. If the 1st degree is chosen for the work, the call down and resume use the Fellowcraft for this portion.
- Team Competition Three person teams of Master Masons from the same lodge who will perform as WM, SW and JW. Same rules as SW competition
- Apron and Sacred Geometry Lectures Open to any Fellowcraft or Master Mason.

There are some inconsistencies with the Standard Work and the Clear Text, these will be taken into consideration and not counted against the competitor. Also, the WM should remove his hat anytime invoking the blessing of deity.

Competitions among the District 7 Lodges (*date to be determined*) will precede a regional competition in which our District will compete with lodges from Districts 4, 5, and 6. Regional competitions must be completed by March 13, 2020, with the winners advancing to the Grand Lodge competition in April.

\$40K – GM Challenge

MWGM Wood has challenged our Grand Jurisdiction to raise \$40,000 for Masonic Charities this year. It's not a number picked out of the sky, there's logic to it: If every 10th Washington Mason donates \$40 (which might go to a Grand Master tie in any other year) that will result in about \$40,000. It's an ask, not an edict.



The Challenge is off to a good start, and that's great. But what we really need is a good finish.

What's our District's quota? Well, it's an ask so there isn't one. But if we follow the Grand Master's arithmetic the 374 Masons in our District could yield \$1,496. If we push that to \$50 per every 10th Mason we'd raise \$1,870. Personally, I like big numbers. I'd love to see our District raise \$2,000, however keeping in mind that no one should give beyond the length of their cable tow. And this isn't for bragging rights; we should heed one of the most enduring lessons from the Mark Master degree - no gift is too small.

But more importantly, the team ties were an important part of the team uniform, which provides a shared identity for those working with the Grand Master for the Masonic year.

For many of us who have had the honor of serving the Craft for many years, these items live on as reminders of meetings and events that we shared with Brethren, Families and Friends. Although wearing a Past Grand Master's pin is generally not done (out of respect for the current GM), the same is not true of the tie, which can be worn on any occasion when not serving as a team member.

For example, last month I was at a meeting of one of the Concordant Bodies I belong to. I wore the Team tie I had from when I was a Grand Lodge Committeeman during MWB John D. McNab's term.
